Talitha Koum Society and LCS's Annual General Meeting

On Saturday, November 11th, Remembrance Day, we were treated to an informative and heart-warming account of the **incredibly successful recovery organization** named Talitha Koum. Terry O'Neill, a



well-known former Coquitlam councilor and longtime journalist, introduced his wife Mary, retired Principal of Dr. Charles Best Secondary, with almost four decades of experience as a Coquitlam educator.

Mary explained that TK currently operates with two residential houses, both in Coquitlam, each with room for 9 women, and their children. And they are hoping to raise funding to add a third home. That would raise the potential to helping almost two dozen women in various stages of recovery from addiction.



Mary explained that the organization was started by a woman addict. While in prison she had a religious experience of deep peace on being prayed for by a prison chaplain. Starr Peardon, after leaving prison, was helped by a priest who gave her \$10 000 so she could rent the first recovery home. She chose the name Talitha Koum, Aramaic for "little girl, rise up" from the gospel of Mark.

Mary's guest speaker, Terri, a former addict, completed the 12-step recovery program and went on

to help at TK for several years. Her honest and inspiring testimony touched our hearts and perfectly encapsulated "loving our clients back to life", TK's motto. By the grace of God and the love of many people, TK, founded 23 years ago, will help many more women recover, and will continue teach them some life skills to help sustain their recovery, and offer the kind of love that we all need in life. 








Life Chain 2023 St. Luke's

This year St. Luke's participants held their demonstration from noon to 1 pm. The parish chose to start early to attract more people. Membership Drive 2023

We are very happy that our numbers of paid-up people continue to increase. This is not the case in all parishes, but thanks to St. Clare of Assisi and St. Luke's and St. Pat's, overall numbers are up from 262 last year to 296 this year. Most parishes stayed about the same or dropped slightly this year.

Canada's euthanasia programme flirting with eugenics.

Kevin Yuill Associate Professor of History at the University of Sunderland, England, who recently visited Canada, wrote:

"A few weeks ago, I accidentally toured one of the awful tent cities in Vancouver, Canada. At the corner of Main Street and Hastings Avenue, homeless drug addicts spread their few possessions out on blankets and cover the pavement for blocks on end. It is only a short distance from the restaurants and attractions of this fairly affluent city and is easy to stray into"....

"So long as they are not violent, homeless addicts are generally ignored across the city. Vancouverites, in that polite Canadian way, accept their presence and do what they can to be kind. Nonetheless, everyone I met spoke about the 'crisis' of addicts in Vancouver, where drugs have effectively been <u>decriminalised</u>"....

Now, the Canadian authorities seem to have come up with <u>a novel, frightening solution to the crisis</u>: euthanasia.

Yuill explains:

..."those suffering from mental illnesses – with no physical ailments necessary – <u>will also</u> <u>be eligible for MAID</u>. That includes people with substance-use disorders."

Last week, a framework for assessing people with substance-use disorders for MAID was discussed at the annual conference for the Canadian Society of Addiction Medicine in British Columbia. Dr David Martell (ironically a winner of the Family Physician of the Year award) was one of the most vocal supporters of expanding MAID to drug addicts. Dr Martell declared that 'it's not fair to exclude people from eligibility purely because their mental disorder might either partly or in full be a substance-use disorder. It has to do with treating people equally.'

Yuill provides a history lesson on eugenics:

For instance, in the first few years of the 20th century, Dr Ella K Dearborn cheerfully <u>called for</u> 'euthanasia for the incurably ill, insane, criminals and degenerates'. Similarly, in 1906, sociologist L Graham Crozier agreed with her medical compatriot: 'I would personally rather administer chloroform to the poor, starving children of New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and other American cities, than to see them living as they must in squalor and misery.'

In an echo of today's advocates for legalised assisted dying, Dr Dearborn once thundered: 'Do not let sentiment or superstition retard the wheels of worldwide progress.' In Canada, this so-called progress shows no sign of stopping.
